BERKELEY: OUT OF THE BLUE

One autumn morning in 1982 I was sitting at my desk in my university office. The phone rang. I picked it up and heard:

'Dr. Mangan, I am Sheldon Rothblatt. You probably do not know me.'

(ironies of ironies. On my desk sat a selection of his books. Professor Rothblatt was the leading authority on nineteenth century 'Oxbridge'. At that very moment I had open before me his The Revolution of the Dons).

He continued:

'I have just read your Athleticism and I understanding you are now turning your attention to the manifestation of the ideology in the Ancient Universities. I have been asked to peer review your paper for History of Higher Education, 'Oars and the Man: Pleasure and Purpose in Victorian and Edwardian Cambridge'. I would like to offer you a Research Fellowship at the Center for Studies in Higher Education at Berkeley to be taken up at our mutual convenience'

I accepted, of course!

FELLOWSHIPS

My first Fellowship was in 1983. I took up others in 1987 and 1993.

The intellectual ambience at the Center was electric. My own intellectual development was nourished, stimulated and advanced. The friendship extended to me by Professor Rothblatt was warm, encouraging and memorable: precious and unforgettable.

I owe Professor Rothblatt much. His stimulating ideas, his scholastic brilliance and above all, the generosity of his friendship will always be remembered.

Sheldon Rothblatt was honored by the Swedish Crown in 2010 as Knight Commander of the Royal Order of the Polar Star (founded 1748), Sweden's highest award to foreigners. He is Professor of History Emeritus at the University of California, Berkeley and sometime Director of the Center for Studies in Higher Education. He is a recipient of the Berkeley Citation for "distinguished achievement and for notable service to the University," Educated at Berkeley and King's College Cambridge University, he also holds an honorary doctorate from Gothenburg University in Sweden. He has been a Visiting Fellow of four Oxford University colleges, Princeton University and the Japan Society for the Advancement of Science. He is a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society of Britain, a Fellow of the Society for Research in Higher Education (UK), a Foreign Member of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences (the body that awards the Nobel Prizes) and a Member of the National Academy of Education (USA). Besides teaching in American universities, he has taught in Australia, Austria, Sweden and Norway. His academic publications are on the comparative history of universities, with translations in Russian, German, Spanish, Italian, Swedish, Japanese and Chinese. These include The Revolution of the Dons, Cambridge and Society in Victorian England (1968 and 1981), The Modern University and Its Discontents, the Fate of Newman's Legacies in Britain and America (1997), with a Chinese translation in 2013, and Education's Abiding Moral Dilemma: Merit and Worth in the Cross-Atlantic Democracies, 1800-2006 (2007).




Annual Visiting Professor, Mid - 1980 - Early 2000 SEA LAPPED CAMPUS

LOOKING EASTWARD

In September 2012 the distinguished East Asian Studies scholar, and noted authority on Japan, Professor William W. Kelly, hosted at the Yale University Council on East Asian Studies a long planned IJHS/SGS Conference Workshop on East Asia we initially discussed in 2009. Conjointly with the conference, he generously invited me to deliver a 'Special Lecture' on the dissemination into Asia of the influential and pervasive English education ideology, Athleticism, which at the zenith of the power of British Empire spread across the globe impacting on Asia and on East Asia, including Japan. His invitation advanced further my serendipitous academic journey towards East Asia which owed its initial impetus to a fortuitous meeting in 1988 with a far-sighted academic, formely at LSE, at the University of New England, Australia, who informed me impatiently that by the end of the twenty-first century East Asia would be 'the centre of the world': the outcome was my Asiatic epiphany.

The resulting intellectual Oriental Odyssey via Japan, South Korea, Singapore and above all China, is not yet completed.

Involvement with Peking University, Beijing and its catalytic Professor Dong Jinxia (formerly an outstanding doctoral student at my British research centre) and the research centre she created there and especially my present engagement with the China Communication University of China, its MLeague and the CUC Press in Beijing with its impressively creative Professor Luo Qing and her exceptionally skilled colleague, Ren Tianwei has ensured that Thubron - like I have been drawn deeper into the creatively invigorating, intellectually stimulating and dynamically inspirational universe of burgeoning East Asia - and its scholars.

Logically, the happy admission above, brings me back to Professor William Kelly and the YCEAS conference, seminar and lecture programme he hosted; memorable in insight, analysis and vision.

Mangan is founding Executive Academic Editor of The International Journal of the History of Sport and of the Routledge Series on Sport in the Global Society.
